The El Farolito meeting was started with the Serenity Prayer, and Introductions. We had 12 persons present. I began the meeting with a rundown of current ELF financials: November's beginning balance was \$1087.52, deposits were 621.29, debits were \$445.29 for an ending balance of \$1263.52.

There has been a steady decline of groups receiving the ELF. Some is due to attrition, moving or not updating addresses. Any group that wished to receive the El Farolito needs only to send me and email with the groups name, and a mailing address. New GSR'S and ELF reps, please remember to update the information needed to keep the El Farolito coming to your group.

I asked to members if one would be interested in helping me with keeping the 'books'- banking, and recording of all financial transactions, and Tylka volunteered. Thank You!

Submissions of essays, stories, what's happening in your neighborhood with A.A. are always welcome. I ask that you try to keep it under 800 words. Mailing parties are also needed. In the past year, no group or district has volunteered. I come to you with all supplies, and 3-4 people can knock it out in about 2.5 to 3 hours. A question was asked as to how the El Farolito was funded. The ELF is

self-supporting by receiving group and district, along with individual contributions. A separate checking account Is maintained by the Area and its Treasurer. The editor receives a copy of the statement at the beginning of each month. Individuals and groups are encouraged to subscribe to the ELF, either by mail or web. I went over the changes from the General Service Conference that pertained to Literature, there were a couple of edits to the 12 Steps and 12 Traditions, some pamphlets had wording changed and there will be a 5th edition of the Big Book. In addition to the 5th edition, there will be a translation of the Big Book into Plain Language, this will enable readers to understand what they are reading easier and quicker. If you want to learn more about Plain Language,

the website <u>www.plainlanguage.gov</u> has all the answers.

AAWS now has available on its website a link to download the newly revised Service Manual, a 254-page pdf. Printed copies are also available to order, I am not sure when they became available, but it was not enough time for me to order some when I did find out about them.

A lot of conference approved literature is now available on various reseller sites, such as Amazon and Barnes and Noble as well as many others. On Amazon, caution is advised as there are many 3rd party resellers but what I look for is the AAWS as the provider. This ensure that World Services does get money from the transaction as well as it saves you money. I have seen 3rd party copies of the Big Book sell for 20 – 30 dollars whereas the AAWS copy is \$6.99.

So, whether it is a printed version or an electronic version, never stop reading!

The last meeting of the Area 46 Treatment Committee occurred during the Assembly at 9:55 on December 4th in Raton, with seventeen in person and six via ZOOM. I would like to thank the Area for the opportunity to serve during this rotation and give a shout-out to the Tech Team for their extraordinary work. Congratulations go out to Ron N. on his appointment of Area Treatment Chair during the next rotation.

For persons looking for a service opportunity, a link to the State's list

of licensed treatment facilities will be included on the service side of the area website. Its purpose is to provide volunteers with a resource of those facilities in the area that meet State minimum standards.

There was a discussion on the morphing of the Pandemic to an Endemic – that we will be dealing with modified behavior for some time. As part of the transfer process, it was pointed out the *Treatment Committee Workbook*, available from GSO, as an essential resource. Commented that the Treatment Committee, according to the workbook, has opportunities in areas outside of pure treatment facilities including, in Area 46, outreach and "seeder" meetings in remote areas and Pueblos.

We discussed how to approach a facility as well as making use of the services of our sister committees, BTG, Correction and CPC. It was mentioned that due to the unique position of bringing meetings into facilities, there is a need to exert some direction to those participating as one irate participate can turn off the facility to all AA and that volunteers may be the only edition of the Big Book anyone sees.

As Chair, I suggested continued use of the technology we have had to use to keep the Committee informed and to share experiences. It was suggested that we need to do what we can to include the "lone wolf" volunteers into the committee so that we may benefit from their experience.

Technology

December Hybrid Assembly

We had our first-ever hybrid assembly in December 2021. Overall, it was successful in that Area 46 46 business was conducted and committee meetings were held. As expected, there were some rough spots which need to be ironed out for future assemblies. A HUGE thank you to all tech team members both online and in person. The assembly truly would not have happened without you. Thank you to District 6 for your responsiveness to make sure the tech team had what they needed.

Special thanks to Laura, our incoming Technology Committee chair. She stayed late and came in early to help me make sure everything was working properly for the assembly. Special thanks also to Bill L. who went above and beyond to help me spec and test equipment prior to the assembly.

Attendance at our first hybrid assembly was about 50/50 in person and online. This shows that Area 46 hybrid events are viable. The sincere hope is that it will allow some to participate in service who would not be able to do so otherwise.

As a Technology Committee, we learned much from this assembly. Some issues were obvious (sound and microphones) and many other issues were solved behind the scenes. I made a motion for up to another \$1000 in the 2022 budget to upgrade microphones/sound. The motion was passed.

Technology Committee Meeting – Dec 2021

Our committee had 13 in person and 12 online. The first half of our meeting we reflected on the accomplishments of this rotation and then we looked ahead. The second half of our meeting was a discussion about the benefits and the pitfalls of online meetings (service meeting and regular meetings).

Accessibility is by far the biggest benefit of online meetings. One of the pitfalls we discussed is getting into an "us and them" mentality. The other major pitfall is that attending online can lesson the impact of the discussion because home has too many distractions. This seems to be especially true for younger members.

In looking ahead, we talked about how technology is a tool that can assist A.A. members in performing their service work for A.A. We also talked about how the new website was created to be a service tool. The service site has many resources for GSR's, DCM's, and chairs of committees at the district and area level.

Our new website was a labor of love. Hundreds of hours went into its planning and development. It was constructed with A.A. service in mind. It is meant to be a rich resource for all of us in A.A. service at all levels of our upside-down triangle. Young People

At the 2021 December Assembly in our YPAA committee meeting, most of our discussion was centered around how to drive attendance in young people's meetings. Some places are struggling with attendance at their young people-oriented meetings or struggling to get young people into the rooms at all. This opened a discussion of how young people's in other areas drive attendance and what they do to keep young people's AA alive. Here are some highlights from that discussion:

Young people's meetings can be found on Zoom, yet some find that young people don't like zoom. The in-person energy is different and young people seem to prefer that.

Some groups have group chats or utilize social media. Group chats help coordinate fellowship plans, like going out to eat before the meeting, and otherwise hanging out outside the meetings. When everyone is in one messaging group, no one feels left out because everyone in the group has access to the same information at the same time and anyone can choose to participate. That before-and-afterthe-meeting fellowship is important because it shows that there is fun to be had in AA. Facebook groups can be made private in order to protect anonymity.

Game nights were brought up by several groups as a great fellowship activity. These fun events help get people coming back to the meetings. In terms of how to get young people to meetings in the first place, we discussed the idea of not shying away from mainstream society and socializing in bars with other sober friends. This allows us to meet people where they are at.

One group reached a very high level of attendance after hosting NMCYPAA. They also do outreach with juvenile probation and corrections. It was suggested that we have a traveling workshop that could be hosted in different districts around the state. This might help unite some young people within their districts. This is something the committee can start to plan at our monthly meetings.

It was also suggested that this committee have a focus on more remote communities and how to do outreach there. When asked about what we can do in a community when the closest treatment center is 3 hours away, and all other communities are 1.5 hours apart, we discussed how even if young people don't seem to be coming into the rooms, we can be out there to plant the seed and be the example. Networking, staying in touch, and reaching out are important in keeping young people active. Keeping in touch can be as simple as following someone on social media. We plan to talk about what more we can do for remote communities and rural areas at future committee meetings. Those meetings are on the last Sunday of the month at 7pm on Zoom.


