On Friday, prior to the start of the Conference, I attended the 11am open A.A. meeting at GSO. Treasurer

As of April 30, the total loss from budgeted activities was \$880 for 2016. The Area began the year \$396 above reserves. So, we were \$484 below reserves on April 30.

I'm afraid I must inform you that John T. had to step down as Area treasurer in order to fulfill work and family obligations. John has served Area 46 and AA faithfully for many, many years. I hope we will see John back in Area service soon.

I asked Kurt K. to serve as Interim Area Treasurer and he graciously accepted. Public Information

I have a couple of failures to report. There was a Longest Walk 5 - War on Drugs & Domestic Violence event with a march that came through Pueblo's in New Mexico. I believe there was an addition to the event in Pojoaque Pueblo that included recovery organizations such as Al-Anon. I only found out about it about a week before the event.

I tried contacting Pojoaque Pueblo, the Dist. 15 DCM and a few people I knew in the area but could get no details on the event. One of the counselors I had talked to in Pojoaque let me know after the fact that the event had happened and as far as I know AA wasn't represented. I feel this was a missed opportunity to present what AA is and how we can help to this area of Native American Community.

Another event is the Gay Pride Parade in Albuquerque. I have been informed that we had a table at the event in past years that was co-sponsored by a couple of AA groups in Albuquerque. I had made some attempts at contacting two other groups in Albuquerque to see if they would like to co-sponsor a booth with us but haven't had any luck yet thought I did make contact with an individual that promised to pass the information on to one of the groups and let me know what they decided. This event will be on June 11.

The third event I am trying to track down is a September event in Albuquerque as part of Recover Month. The Nation Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration sponsors recovery month to increase understanding of substance abuse and mental health issues and celebrate people in recovery. I had been approached at the Albuquerque Health Fair with information that there was going to be an event and that they wanted us to participate but the suggested table price was high at \$400. However this was preliminary information before the event was organized and I left my contact information and received contact information as well. I haven't been contacted with any further information and the contact information is not active. The E-mails bounce and the phone number goes to someone else's phone.

The real answer to these kinds of issues is to have more people involved with PI who can provide help in getting information and in-site into other avenues to pursue to obtain information. I have a very small pool of names or people who are willing to help with the PI Committee activities and only a small portion of the state is represented.

On the positive side I have met with and talked to 3 individuals about how to approach PI activities at a group level and talked to several people at the Red Road about supporting PI activities in their communities.

Special Needs

Special needs is not just about wheelchair bound people, but also about people with other disabilities such as physically disabled, deaf and hearing impaired, blind and visually impaired, learning and reading impaired, seniors and homebound. Others include those with language barriers and single parents requiring childcare.

How we serve these people is to provide interpreters for meetings and events, as well as Braille AA literature, audio material, programs for special needs, and rides in special cases. We encourage wheelchair accessible meetings/events and big book tape study meetings in each district. The list goes on: assist the physically disabled at events; encourage groups to provide childcare; update special needs information in meeting directories (and on-line); bring meetings into homes, hospital or long-term care facilities; encourage districts and groups to support meetings in special needs facilities; provide literature and workshops on special needs; explore other special needs; and work with GSO and other districts and areas.

As you can see special needs has a very broad range of responsibilities. The Area Special Needs Committee suggested each district's help in the form of a designated individual who carries the message to the groups within each district. This is a big job but together we are confident that everyone who needs and wants the message of hope that Alcoholics Anonymous offers will have the chance to hear it.

We encourage Groups and District to complete the "Special Needs Survey" in efforts to assess how well special needs is being addressed. You can download a copy (both Group and District) surveys and/or complete the survey online from the New Mexico AA Area 46 website's Special Needs page. We suggest that you share your findings with the Area Special Needs Committee.

Please feel free to contact me with any questions and know that myself and committee members are available to speak at your District or provide a workshop.



From AA History Lovers: An interesting history of how Districts and GSRs came to be

In November 1950 a pamphlet titled "Your Third Legacy Will You Accept It" was published to explain the pending Conference plans and procedures. Bill W also wrote a December 1950 Grapevine article titled "Your Third Legacy." The Alcoholic Foundation invited one Conference delegate from each of the then 48 States and the Canadian Provinces. Seven states with large AA populations were assigned additional delegates.

Delegates were divided into two Panels so that half would be elected and half would rotate in odd and even numbered years. Panel 1 areas were asked to form a temporary committee to organize an election assembly no later than March 1951. Bill W traveled across the US attending over two dozen assemblies electing area committees and Conference Delegates.

Area assemblies were first held just for the election of area officers and a delegate. "Group Representatives" (later called "General Service Representatives") who attended, placed an "A" next to their name on the registration form to indicate they were available to serve on the area committee. The first item of assembly business was to create an area map divided into districts. This determined the number of "Committeemen" to be elected. "Committeemen" later came to be called "Committee Members" and then "District Committee Members" (or DCMs).

The entire assembly voted in the election of Committeemen which ended when a nominee received at least 25% of the votes cast. The first three Committeemen elected automatically became the Area Chair, Treasurer and Secretary in that order. The delegate election required a 2/3 majority of the votes cast. If it could not be obtained, the delegate was chosen by lot from among all the Committeemen whether they were standing for the delegate election or not. Each area determined the number of times to vote prior to settling the election by lot. Needless to say, much has changed since then.

On April 20, 1951 - 37 US and Canadian delegates convened at the Commodore Hotel in NYC as the first Panel of the General Service Conference. Bernard B Smith presided. 15 Trustees and 10 staff members from the NY Office and Grapevine joined the Conference as voting members. On April 23, 1952, Panel 2 (consisting of 38 additional delegates) joined with Panel 1 for the first Conference of all Delegates attending. The 1952 Conference approved a new edition of the Third Legacy pamphlet. It began to call the election guidelines the "Third Legacy Method of Elections." Later a much changed version came to be called the "Third Legacy Procedure."

The 1953 Conference recommended that a pamphlet be developed to clarify the duties and responsibilities related to General Services. It was published in December 1953 under the title "Your Role in the General Service Conference." The pamphlet explained the duties and responsibilities of Group Members, Group Representatives, Area Committeemen and Conference Delegates. It also contained the first structure diagram of the General Service Conference.


The 1954 Conference unanimously approved the renaming of the 15-member Alcoholic Foundation to the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous. The renaming took place in October 1954. The Conference also approved renaming the "Group Representative" to "General Service Representative" to be the voice of the group conscience in General Service matters. The General Service Representative was to be listed in the AA Directory instead of the Group Secretary.


SELF-SUPPORT

From the Editor


Once again, I continue to trust in my Higher Power and once again He/She came through. I have a basic policy that if we are below our \$2,500 prudent reserve at the time to put together the issue, I will not produce the 20 pages that costs about \$100 more to print and somewhat more expensive to mail than 16 pages. About a week before the deadline, a group who had been having some health issues with their treasurer and was behind in contributions sent a \$300 check. As of this writing, the bank balance stands at \$2,565.66 so you are reading a 20 page issue again. I should also note we have an inventory of bulk mail stamps worth \$189 and a balance at the Post Office for the mailing account of \$192.96 for total on hand assets of \$2,947.41.

This contribution (and all the others) enabled us to a) not have to edit for size, b) be able to carry flyers and c) allowed room for an interesting history of how Districts and GSRs came to be. I think everyone will agree this makes for a far more interesting and valuable *El Farolito*.

As I go to meetings and travel the state, I am often (too often) asked who gets their group's ELF. My answer is their GSR or lacking a GSR their primary contact. Assuming they have one and assuming they have a good mailing address that is where it is being mailed. If the issue is then not getting to the group it is because the GSR is not bringing it in. If you are a GSR receiving your Group's issue that means you have the privilege of reading it first, it does not mean it is your issue to keep!
